3 SEC. 1277. SENSE OF CONGRESS	ON RELATIONSHIP BE-
4 TWEEN ISRAEL AND	THE PALESTINIANS.

(a) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following find-

1 (1) The United States Government has a long-2 standing position that a peaceful resolution of the 3 conflict between Israel and the Palestinians can only 4 be achieved through direct negotiations between the 5 two parties. 6 (2) The Palestinians have been pursuing a 7 strategy to seek recognition of a Palestinian state 8 through the United Nations, the United Nations 9 specialized agencies, and the United Nations affili-10 ated organizations. (3) On March 17, 2016, the "State of Pal-11 estine" became a party to the United Nations 12 13 Framework Convention Climate Change (UNFCCC) as its 197th member. 14 (4) Section 414 of the Foreign Relations Au-15 thorization Act, Fiscal Years 1990 and 1991 (Public 16 Law 101–246; 22 U.S.C. 287e note) states the fol-17 lowing: "No funds authorized to be appropriated by 18 19 this Act or any other Act shall be available for the United Nations or any specialized agency thereof 20 which accords the Palestine Liberation Organization 21 the same standing as member states." 22 (5) Section 410 of the Foreign Relations Au-23 thorization Act, Fiscal Years 1994 and 1995 (Public 24 Law 103-236; 22 U.S.C. 287e note) states the fol-25

- lowing: "The United States shall not make any vol-1 2 untary or assessed contribution: (1) to any affiliated 3 organization of the United Nations which grants full 4 membership as a state to any organization or group 5 that does not have the internationally recognized at-6 tributes of statehood, or (2) to the United Nations, 7 if the United Nations grants full membership as a 8 state in the United Nations to any organization or 9 group that does not have the internationally recog-10 nized attributes of statehood, during any period in which such membership is effective." 11 12
 - (6) The provisions described in paragraphs (4) and (5) may not be waived.
 - Obama has asserted that those provisions do not apply to the UNFCCC because, according to Department of State spokesman John Kirby, "The UNFCCC is a treaty, and the Palestinians' purported accession does not involve their becoming members of any U.N. specialized agency or, indeed, any international organization."
 - (8) Treaties can create international organizations, as demonstrated by the case of the Charter of the United Nations, which is a treaty that created the United Nations organization.

1	(9) Current United States law often treats enti-
2	ties created by international treaties as international
3	organizations, such as the International Organiza-
4	tions Immunity Act (Public Law 79–291), under
5	which the Executive branch has designated the
6	International Boundary and Water Commission of
7	the United States and Mexico, which was created by
8	United States and Mexico international boundary
9	treaties to assist in their implementation.
10	(10) The UNFCCC established an international
11	organization based in Bonn, Germany that employs
12	approximately 500 people from over 100 countries
13	and has an annual budget in excess of \$60,000,000.
14	(11) The operating entities of the UNFCCC
15	constitute an "affiliated organization of the United
16	Nations" in that the UNFCCC Secretariat is con-
17	nected and linked to the United Nations in many
18	ways, including the following:
19	(A) The United Nations Secretary-General
20	appoints the executive secretary of the
21	UNFCCC secretariat.
22	(B) At the first Conference of the Parties,
23	the UNFCCC decided that its secretariat "shall
24	be institutionally linked to the United Nations".

1	According to the UNFCCC website, it remains
2	"institutionally linked" today.
3	(C) The United Nations serves as Deposi-
4	tory for the UNFCCC, the Kyoto Protocol, and
5	the Paris Agreement.
6	(D) The proposed budget of the United
7	Nations for the biennium 2016–2017 supports
8	the UNFCCC.
9	(E) The United Nations Campus in Bonn,
10	Germany houses the UNFCCC secretariat,
11	which the United Nations lists as one of 18 or-
12	ganizations that represent it and that are part
13	of the "United Nations presence" in Bonn.
14	(F) The UNFCCC secretariat is subject to
15	United Nations rules and regulations regarding
16	procurement and other matters.
17	(G) The UNFCCC secretariat supports
18	what it describes as the "largest annual United
19	Nations conference," which is the Conference of
20	Parties.
21	(b) Sense of Congress.—Congress—
22	(1) reaffirms its longstanding position that the
23	only true and lasting path to resolving the Israeli-
24	Palestinian conflict is through direct negotiations be-
25	tween Israel and the Palestinians;

1	(2) reiterates its strong opposition to any at-
2	tempt to establish or seek recognition of a Pales-
3	tinian state outside of an agreement negotiated be-
4	tween leaders in Israel and the Palestinians;
5	(3) strongly opposes the unilateral actions of
6	the Palestinians to seek statehood recognition
7	through the United Nations, United Nations special-
8	ized agencies, United Nations affiliated organiza-
9	tions, and United Nations treaties, conventions, and
10	agreements;
11	(4) calls on the President to hold the Palestin-
12	ians accountable for their actions to undermine and
13	circumvent the peace process;
14	(5) strongly supports the prohibition on United
15	States funding going to any United Nations affili-
16	ated organization that grants full membership as a
17	state to any organization or group that does not
18	have the internationally recognized attributes of
19	statehood; and
20	(6) reaffirms that, under United States law, the
21	United States is prohibited from making any dis-
22	bursements of United States funds to the UNFCCC
23	secretariat, the Green Climate Fund, the Conference
24	of the Parties, and the Conference of the Parties
25	serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto
